from our Interim Pastor...

LOVE

One fellow said that whenever he was asked to define love, he would stop and think for a minute, then spin around and pin the questioner's arm behind his back and say, "NOW who's asking the questions?"

Most of our difficulty in defining love arises from a fundamental confusion. Often we are thinking of that curious event called "falling in love." No one that I know is capable of defining that phenomenon. Even Albert Einstein would say no more than this: "Gravity is not to be held responsible for people falling in love." "Falling" is an apt description of an otherwise inexplicable behavior.

The Bible recognizes the reality of falling in love but offers little in the way of explaining it. Three things are too wonderful for me; four I do not understand: the way of an eagle in the sky, the way of a serpent on a rock, the way of a ship on the high seas, and the way of a man with a maiden (Proverbs 30:18-19). I will not attempt to explain that which was beyond the understanding of Solomon.

There isn't a lot in the Bible about falling in love, but there is a lot about love. Perhaps that in itself is a great lesson. If "falling in love" doesn't make the transition to "loving," the relationship will last no longer than the feeling. Feelings come and go. But true love is enduring.

The enduring nature of love rests on the solid foundation of God's love for us. But God shows his love for us in that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us (Romans 5:8). God saves us, not because we are lovable, but because he loves. We love, because He first loved us (1 John 4:19).

Euripides said, "He is not a lover who does not love forever." By that definition, God is the first and only real lover. We become true lovers when our love becomes like his.

Have you noticed that God did not make love the criteria for entering the Kingdom? We are commanded to love God with all that we are and to love our neighbor as we love ourselves. Yet love is not the key to the kingdom.

"To be trusted is a greater compliment than to be loved" (George MacDonald). There was a time when I did not believe what George MacDonald said. I thought that being loved was the greatest compliment of all. But I have come to see that loving says more about the one who loves than about the one who is loved. Trust, however, is always about the other person.

In salvation, God does not first ask us to love him. We failed to keep that commandment long ago. Rather, he first asks us to trust him, for that is about who he is. While we often fail in loving as we should, he has never failed. Therefore, he is worthy of our trust. Before we can walk the heights of love ourselves, we must learn to trust the unfailing love of God.

Love is not the key to the kingdom. Rather, it is the evidence that we found the key, opened the door, and entered. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another (John 13:35). As our love becomes more like God's love, we do not boast except to say that we learned it from him. For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life (John 3:16).

Knowing that my acts of service can spread the light of Jesus to others that desperately need it is enough reason to keep doing missions. Missions is something that Jesus called all followers to do, and that is exactly what I want to do.

I also feel called to missions because you can form life-changing connections with people. I love hearing the life stories of the people I meet and what they have gone through.

In the same way, it is amazing to be able to share my life experiences and get to tell others how God has changed my life. The ability to form these connections and to serve in missions have been significant moments in my life.

Doing missions and ministering to others can be difficult, which is understandable. There are moments in my own life when it is hard for me to feel comfortable talking to people, too. But as a follower of Christ, the Holy Spirit resides in you and He will be the push that moves you to connect with other people.

By leaving your comfort zone, with the power of the Holy Spirit, you can do amazing things. God can do amazing things through you. All you have to be is open to what God asks of you, whether it is moving to another country to share your belief in God or simply having a heart-to-heart conversation with your neighbor. Either way, the impact you could have on others by allowing yourself to leave your comfort zone for God is too big for you to ignore.







