#### When Faith Becomes Lonely

I will never forget that moment. I was sitting on a swing in my back yard with a phone pressed to my ear. With a shaky voice I said, "Thank you. Have a good night," and I hung up the phone. Immediately tears ran down my face. Crying then gave way to sobbing as I fell even deeper into the despair that had gripped me. I had just moved my pregnant wife and two small children halfway across the country following the call of God

only to find out that the ministry we had come for decided to go in a different direction. Now what was I going to do? I had no ministry, no way to provide for my family, our third child was due in a few weeks and I had nothing to offer.

I had already been on my "Road to Troas" for some time. My journey was not one of great personal loss; instead, it was a time of wandering without direction. I wanted to serve God with my life, but I had no idea where He was taking me. After years of prayer and many closed doors, I began to feel my heart drawn toward pastoral ministry. I followed God, trusting Him to provide a way. Finally, the doors seemed wide open, but that night on the swing, they all came crashing shut. That night was when my Christian walk became an uphill journey, filled with tears, littered with doubt, assaulted by the devil's lies. Looking back, it does not feel like there was ever an easy step on this road.

During this time, every day was different. Some days I was hopeful and other days I was blind to hope. Some days it seemed that my faith was hanging by a thread and as my life storm roared, it seemed I was only one gust of wind away from that thread breaking. Yet, in the midst of my weakness, the strength of God was on display.

While I was weak in the flesh, the never-ending power of God was supplying all that I lacked. What Christ told Paul was true for me: "My Grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness" (II Corinthians 12:9). While Christ says this to Paul in regards to the thorn in his flesh, it is no less true in the midst of any weakness. That is why Paul responds by saying, "For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong." If the all-sufficient grace of God is magnified by my weakness, then the story of my weak faith is also the story of God's great power.

The question was never, "Is my faith strong enough to overcome this?" The question is, "Will the Author and Finisher of my faith be powerful enough to finish the work that he started in me?" You see, my faith was never the product of human strength or will-power. First Peter 1:5 makes this very clear when it says "...you, who by God's power are being guarded through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time." From a human perspective, my faith was held up by a thread, but from a heavenly perspective, I was secured to Jesus by a 2-ton anchor chain. Ultimately, my faith did not fail because the One who promised to uphold it never fails.

Think about the implications of this: the God who created the heavens and the earth with the words of His mouth is the God who upholds your faith. The God who has stretched out the heavens and hung the stars in the sky is the One who guards you for a salvation ready to be revealed. There is nothing that can contend with the power of God, therefore there is nothing that could circumvent His protection. True faith does not fail because the power of God cannot fail. So then, my testimony is simple: in my weakness, God was strong, and I exalt Him because of His faithfulness to a wretch like me.

So when you hit the mountain miles in your walk of faith and every step seems to push the limits of what you can withstand, know that God will never leave you nor forsake you. It is His mighty hand that protects your faith. At the end of your trial you will be able to say, "For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:38-39).

#### Calling ALL Women! Celebrating WMU in Alaska

The following article by Meghan Bowker (editor of Missions Mosaic) is in our August Missions Mosaic magazine. As I was reading the article, it has special meaning to me.

Judy Rice transplanted to Alaska to become WMU Director. She started a Women's Retreat which is held every year in April. The NC Baptists had a partnership with Alaska and several women from Rocky Hock, Corinth, and Edenton Baptist were able to go 2002 - 2005 to help with the retreat. The group of Rocky Hock women were Lois Ashley, Lorrie Byrum, Marcia Evans, Lisa Eure, Frances Evans, Jean Lindblom, Shirley Madry, Patsy Tynch, Brenda Weeks, and Belva White. We planned meals and cooked for a week to feed those attending. We also provided child care and activities and Bible stories for their children. I was able to attend 2 retreats along with my mother and sister. This has brought back some great memories as we shared Jesus in Alaska. Hope you enjoy the article!

A woman in Portland, Oregon was only 26 years old when she received a surprising phone call: Would she serve as WMU Director in Alaska? She responded, "Where is Alaska, and what does a WMU Director do? Judy Rice was willing to be transplanted. That same year, 1968, she moved to Anchorage.

Alaska WMU had been formed 11 years earlier in 1957 (two years before Alaska became a state). As its first director, Judy had a hand in shaping the organization. Having been involved with Baptist Young Women, she organized a retreat for Baptist young women and leaders. She emphasized the fact that everyone has a part to play in missions. Because she knew this truth in her life, she told the women, "His plans are tailor made for each of you." She urged them to "trust God with the results" of following those plans and "get excited about what those results can be."

Judy Zach, who served as Alaska WMU President from 1994 to 1999 and 2014 to 2018 said, "Judy Rice was the backbone of Alaska WMU. She has an unwavering love for missions and missions support.

"I first met Judy when I served as Baptist Women's Director for the Tanana Valley Baptist Association in the mid-1980s. She helped me learn how to preside at women's events and how to organize. She knew how to delegate and organize well. When I served as Alaska WMU President, she was patient and supportive, and we worked well together. She became a great friend. I have a great love and respect for Judy Rice, who was a model of missions in my life. And I always liked her colorful socks!

Judy Zach also remembers her friend as an enthusiastic proponent of training: she encouraged Alaska Baptist women to attend WMU Week in Glorieta, New Mexico each year. The women who attended grew as leaders, and in turn, Alaska WMU grew. Judy Rice modeled going on mission with trips to Russia and Portland, Oregon and she supported outreach to Alaska Native peoples across the state. In those far-flung villages, she became well known and loved.

The retreat Judy Rice started in her early days of leading Alaska WMU became the annual Baptist Young Women House Party held every April. In 1981, its name changed to the Women on Mission Celebration. The celebration is a highly anticipated occasion, when women from distant villages and towns across the state gather for encouraging worship, Bible teaching, and missionary testimonies. It has a multicultural flair as women from Filipino, Alaska Native, African American, European, and Samoan heritages attend faithfully. They take up the offering, assist in registration, and lead in congregational worship through song and dance.

The celebration is held at the Alaska Baptist Resource Network building in Anchorage, the state's largest city. Free time means shopping opportunities, an added bonus most attendees appreciate. But the highlight, of course, is missions: local, national, and global. Every year, missionaries from the North American Mission Board and International Mission Board speak at the celebration. For the women who live in and near Anchorage, refugees are a missions opportunity. The city welcomes refugees from Ukraine, Afghanistan, and Somalia, among other countries. Like residents in many US cities that receive refugees, Alaskans can minister to internationals without leaving their state.

God used Judy Rice to unite the Baptist women of Alaska around missions, and that desire is with her yet: she serves on the Alaska WMU leadership team as co-representative of the Chugach Association. Like she once said, His plans are tailor made for every woman willing to be used by Him. And every woman, of every age, has a place in WMU.
