Saptist Women

Ministry leaders, pastors, and missionaries make many appointments—lunch meetings, evening trainings, speaking engagements, coffee chats. In the US, we are sure to be five minutes early in an effort not to be disrespectfully late. I had a teacher who drilled into my head that "to be early was to be on time and to be on time was to be late." So, imagine my surprise when I entered a new culture as a missionary to an unreached people group in northeastern Brazil. I was convinced that Brazilian clocks and watches must keep time differently than mine. People came to dinner 30, 40, 50 minutes late. Church services started late. Friends showed up to our daughter's birthday party two hours late. I was beyond confused and often, beyond angry. I could not wrap my head around why people would be so disrespectful.

After spending much time with these same people, I began to see a trend. Being late was not always a show of disrespect. During our early time in Brazil, we did not have a vehicle and relied on others to take us places. I realized our friends would allow themselves to be late to their own scheduled engagements in order to take us to a church service or the grocery store. People would stop to chat with a friend on the street with no regard for time. Relationships were first. People came before appointments. Sometimes tardiness was a result of someone just following custom and coming whenever they chose, but there was never an attitude of disrespect. It was merely cultural.

In John 4, Jesus met the woman at the well at an hour unusual for women to frequent the well. However, it was an appointed hour set by God. Jesus was there for a reason, to speak with a specific lady. **Through this encounter, her town heard the Good News of Jesus.** I can imagine the conversations among the disciples. Surely, they knew that this route, this rest at the well, would change their schedule. I wonder what they had to say to Jesus about this delay. Certainly, they shook their heads in wonder. How often do we get caught up in daily, set schedules, and miss opportunities to share the love of Jesus? How often do we stay tight to our routines and allow relationships to get swept away in to-do lists and reminders?

In our village context, the Gospel is shared through story-telling in homes. Appointments are verbally made and never written on a yellow sticky note. One Sunday, our leaders scheduled a time to story-tell in the home of two nonbelievers. We all headed to the back of the village at the appointed time. We noticed a man walking down the road toward us. It was the gentleman with whom we were to meet. He was headed out somewhere, not our meeting. He told us his wife had something else to do, and we would have to meet another time. Though this is a common, cultural practice that didn't take us by surprise, we are always frustrated and disheartened when this happens. However, relationships are first. Our leader did not become angry with the gentleman, but casually chatted with him about life. I felt we had missed an opportunity to share the gospel. We had missed an opportunity to tell someone the Good News of Jesus Christ. But our native leader continued building a friendship and relationship with this nonbeliever.

Instead of turning around and heading home, we did what we planned to do. Our leader suggested we go back to another house and share the stories we had prepared. Probably similar to some of the disciples, I shook my head and wondered if it was even worth deviating from our set schedule. We shared the gospel with two other nonbelievers that night. Was this the appointed hour God had set for their ears to hear the Good News? Was I allowing man's schedule to dictate God's timing? Was one man's tardiness and cancellation leading us to the open heart of another?

Of course, Jesus knew that the woman would be at the well at the sixth hour. I did not know who else we may encounter that evening. What I do know is that God's timing often does not align with my iPhone calendar. His timing is just that, His timing. Our eyes must be looking for the next open heart searching for a Savior. Isn't that what we are charged with in The Great Commission? Go, tell, and make disciples. It doesn't say, "Go at 8:00 on Friday. Tell at 9:30 on Saturday. Make disciples at 10:30 on Monday." We must go, tell, and make disciples when He gives us the opportunity. I do not suggest showing up two hours late to a birthday party in the US. I don't even suggest trashing our sticky notes. But, I do wonder where sharing the Good News is on my daily to-do list. Does God allow tardiness and cancellations to write His name back on our list of things to do? That friend stuck in traffic could allow us an extra few minutes with a colleague who needed gentle words of encouragement. Being five minutes late to coffee (or maybe just right on time) allows us an opportunity to support a frightened college student entering his first interview. The cancellation of storytelling in one home may lead to salvations in the next home. Let's take a page out of the Brazilian playbook and build relationships, encourage friendships, and support one another in the unexpected moments. Maybe that is the appointed hour God has allowed for someone to hear the Good News of Jesus!

Suggested items are: toys (dolls, stuffed animals, toy cars, jump ropes, yo-yos), hygiene items (toothbrushes, combs, hairbrushes, wash cloths), school supplies (pens, pencils, crayons, markers, notebooks, solar calculators), and other accessories (socks, sunglasses, jewelry, flashlights with batteries). <u>DO NOT</u> include any food, candy, or gum, toothpaste, war-related items, liquids, or breakable items. Shoeboxes and labels are available in the vestibule. This ministry helps reach children all around the world in the name of Jesus. Help us take the Gospel to the ends of the earth!

Chase Bateman was just 19 years old when he was involved in an ATV accident in October of 2021. Due to severe internal injuries, he received over 64 units of blood products during his hospital stay. During the first 24 hours, Chase received 36 units of that blood. After a 23 day fight to live, Chase succumbed to his injuries on November 9, 2021. If it wasn't for the availability of blood products and the care of a phenomenal health care team, we would not have been blessed with those extra 23 days to love on him. Don't ever think it can't happen to you. Start giving blood every chance you get! We are truly blessed to have this Blood Drive in memory of him. As Chase would say, "I've Got This!"
