In my devotional time, I noticed something recently. In Psalm 33:18 it says, "Behold the eye of the Lord is on those who fear Him, On those who hope for his lovingkindness." In the very next Psalm, verse 15 says something similar, "The eyes of the Lord are toward the righteous, and His ears are open to their cry." In both of these texts, we see an idea that the eyes of the Lord are upon someone. I found myself asking the question what does it mean that the eyes of God are upon me? After all, doesn't he see everything? Doesn't he know all? It does not mean that by my actions I

have caught God's attention and caused Him to notice me; he sees all and knows all. It means that God is looking upon me with care. If I tell my children that I am watching over them, it doesn't mean that they have finally gotten me to notice them, it means that in love and tenderness, my protective and loving attention is devoted to them. I am seeing them in love and pursuing them in care. This is what it means: He sees and hears you and He cares.

Notice who his eyes are over. They are described in 3 ways: those that fear Him, those that hope for His lovingkindness, and those who are righteous. In essence, these are 3 ways of describing the same thing: a person who seeks to surrender to the mighty hand of God while living a life of worship to Him. And as we do this, we can delight Abba is watching, His caring, protective, tender gaze is upon us. So I encourage you this month to seek Him. Hope in His lovingkindness. Pursue the righteousness provided in Christ.

On Sunday, November 3, 1996, a group of mountain folk gathered for a special church service. Nestled in the rural backwoods of North Georgia, just a stone's throw from the NC State Line, they convened for a "note-burning" ceremony; their debts had been paid!

In the late 80's, this church was on the "leaving side" of a bitter split from a church only 2 miles down the road. After several months of meeting in a schoolhouse, they contacted my recently-retired Pawpaw about being their first Pastor. His response was simple and to-the-point: "I don't want to come unless the Lord is going with me." After much prayer, he discerned that the Lord was, indeed, leading Him to the church, and it was a blessed time in the Lord.

Some years later, my Dad became their Pastor. And on November 3, 1996, *my first birthday*, he oversaw their "note burning" ceremony. I don't remember much... but, fortunately, we have video footage of the event! My Pawpaw preached the Sermon of Consecration. In it, he reiterated his earlier sentiment to the church – he had accepted the Pastorate for one reason, and one reason only -- because God had given His blessing.

It was mere happenstance that I came across this old VHS tape at my parents' house in December 2023. We were in the process of seeking God's will, and were still in conversations with the Search Committee here at Rocky Hock. From the beginning, we knew that God was in it... yet, we knew we would be leaving a lot of family and friends to accept this call – not to mention, the mountains, which we love.

As I sat there, amidst my wondering... my Pawpaw's voice pierced through the TV screen, and I heard him say: "I didn't want to go unless God was going with me." And I'm glad I came, because look at what God has done through you wonderful people.

In this moment, God granted us peace and serenity. I knew it wouldn't be long before we would be "east bound and down, loaded up, and truckin' " for Edenton. And, I knew that we would be going with God's full endorsement and help.

I want you to know that we're excited to be here... and we're here on call from God. I'm so excited to serve alongside you all and worship Jesus with you each and every week! Something special is happening in our Youth and Children's departments... I can feel it, and I think you can, too! Can I get an "Amen?"

Missions Here and There / This Month's Spotlight

Closing lines are important. For better or for worse, some of history's greatest figures are remembered for their last words. Benjamin Franklin's final words were, "A dying man can do nothing easy." As he was dying, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, author of the Sherlock Holmes stories, turned to his wife and said, "You are wonderful." And moments before he passed away, Winston Churchill whispered, "I'm bored with it all."

We read about them, and we talk about them. Sometimes we might even etch them in stone. We assign special significance to famous last words.

The Gospel writer Mark recounted the most famous last words in all of history. In Mark 16, just before Jesus' disciples watched Him ascend into heaven, Mark wrote, "He said to them, 'Go into all the world and proclaim the gospel to the whole creation.'" (vs. 15, ESV)

Jesus' final earthly command was for everyone, then and now, who would believe in His name and commit to follow Him. For the last 2,000 years, anyone who has crossed a street, a continent, or an ocean to "proclaim the gospel to the whole creation" has done so in obedience to this Great Commission.

When some people hear the word obedience, they picture an unwelcome list of troublesome but necessary chores. Yet, for those of us who've embraced Jesus' free gift of salvation, obedience is a by-product of the grace we've received. As Jesus told His disciples, "If you love me, you will keep my commandments." (John 14:15, ESV)

The task of making Jesus known is not a burden but rather a privilege.

A STORY OF HOPE Kinzie Frey - Blood and Platelet Recipient

After months of vague symptoms and emergency room visits, 6 year old Kinzie Frey was diagnosed with Stage 4, High Risk Neuroblastoma, a type of cancer that can grow into tumors. Her tumor was collectively the size of a mini basketball, originating on her right adrenal gland and was tangled throughout her abdomen, wrapping around veins, arteries and organs from her heart to her pelvis.

Kinzie's doctor immediately began an aggressive treatment protocol to fight the cancer and prevent it from returning. After her second round of chemo, she had a procedure to remove some of her stem cells. The cells were preserved and given back to her during two stem cell transplants. Each transplant required a month in the hospital and strict precautions that prevented her from returning to school or going to public places.

Kinzie developed a late complication from the stem cell transplant that caused her body to break down blood cells at an alarming rate and required numerous blood and platelet transfusions. Over 18 months, Kinzie received 46 red blood cell transfusions and 72 platelet transfusions. Her mother, Holly Bosse, says, "If it weren't for the generosity of blood donors, Kinzie wouldn't be here with us today. Those blood donations aren't only a gift to Kinzie, but to our family, friends and supporters."
