In 2 Chronicles 20, we find the king of Judah, Jehoshaphat, in a terrible circumstance. The nations of the Moabites, the Ammonites, and the Meunites were all rising up against the nation of Judah and it seemed hopeless for the people. In this moment, the king falls on his face before God in the midst of the assembly on the temple mount and prays. After recounting the history of God's providence over His people, the king simply says in verse 12, "O our God, will You not judge them? For we are powerless before this great multitude who

are coming against us; nor do we know what to do, but our eyes are on You."

God brings trials in our lives. He brings us into situations in which we feel helpless so that we can get to the same point that Jehoshaphat is in here, *"our eyes are on You."* If this was the end of this text, it would be a helpful word, but it's not the end.

In verse 14, God sends a prophet to the king and God says to the people, "do not be dismayed because of this great multitude, for the battle is not yours but God's." He then instructs the people to go out and meet them on the battlefield, but then He says something very strange in verse 17. "You need not fight in this battle; station yourselves, stand and see the salvation of the Lord on your behalf, O Judah and Jerusalem. Do not fear or be dismayed; tomorrow go out and face them for the Lord is with you."

Beloved, I do not know what you are facing this day, but when you turn your eyes to God and surrender your steps to Him, you can know that through the work of Jesus Christ, He will fight your battles. He is with you. This doesn't mean everything will go the way you want it to go; it means God will use the outcome for His Glorious purpose in your life. Let Him fight the battle.



"... astonishment hath taken hold on me. Is there no balm in Gilead; is there no physician there? Why then is not the health of the daughter of my people recovered?" ~ Jeremiah 8:21b-22

One of my earliest memories is a happy one. I was just 3 years old when some of our rarely-seen relatives from Oregon came in for a visit. That side of my

Mom's family had left the mountains after the Great Depression - seeking work and better opportunities out west. Apparently, they found what they were looking for because they hardly ever came home!

I'm not sure why I remember this day so well — but it must've been such a momentous event that my little brain decided to flip the switch of awareness. I have no memory of anything prior to that visit... but from that moment on, I was totally aware!

I remember riding over to my Great-Grandmother's house in Murphy, North Carolina that day where everyone had gathered. It was a true southern porch scene — some sat on the swing, others on the stoop, and a few in those old-school webbed folding chairs. Everyone was glad to be together. And I was happy, too... that is, until I felt something strange and painful inside my mouth.

A quick inspection by the family council revealed the culprit: a mouth ulcer. My kinfolk were sympathetic, but one woman in particular — one of those long-lost Oregonian Great-Aunts — took action! She drove down to the local Kerr Drug and came back with two items!

The first was a Twix bar. I had never had one before and to this day, it's still my favorite candy bar. Second, she brought a small green and white bottle labeled *Ulcer Ease*. The taste was horrendous — like antiseptic with a splash of peroxide — but the moment it touched the sore... the pain vanished. Sweet relief! For the next few days, whenever the discomfort returned, I knew I could ask for more of that stuff and it would carry me through until healing came.

I never saw those people again, and they've all passed on now. Truthfully, I couldn't tell you any of their names. But I'll never forget their kindness — especially the kindness of my Great-Aunt who knew just what to do!

Did you know that people had medicines and remedies like this even in Bible times? One of the most famous was known as the Balm of Gilead, which was a fragrant, healing ointment from the region east of the Jordan River. In Jeremiah 8, the Prophet uses this medicine as a metaphor as he mourns the spiritual condition of his people. "Is there no balm in Gilead? Is there no physician there? Why then is not the health of the daughter of my people recovered?" (v. 22)

In other words, Jeremiah was asking, "Isn't there anything that can heal us? Isn't there anyone who can help?" The tragedy is compounded in Jeremiah 46:11 when it says, "In vain shalt thou use many medicines; for thou shalt not be cured." We find that their deepest wounds weren't physical - they were spiritual; no earthly cure would help. What they needed was Divine intervention; true healing that only comes through repentance.

That same need still exists today. Many of us walk around wounded — "spiritually ulcered," so to speak; trying everything under the sun to numb the pain. But there is only one balm that truly works, and that's the healing grace of Jesus Christ. So, if you're hurting today — if you've got something deep in your soul that stings — don't turn to the world for relief. Turn to the Lord! He knows exactly where it hurts. And, just like my long-lost Great-Aunt from Oregon... He's already gone to get just what you need.




